sculpture	The art of making 3D forms especially by carving stone or wood or by casting metal or plaster.	
3D form	A form is a three-dimensional figure - as opposed to a shape, which is two-dimensional, or flat.	
mod-roc	Type of plaster bandage used to make sculpture.	
wire	Artists either loop, bend, or wrap a single wire or several wires to form a desired shape.	S
wire cutter	Small pliers whose jaws have cutting edges that meet at an angle, which allows for extra firm clamping and nipping action.	
pliers	Pliers that have rounded edges on the jaws are ideal for shaping wire.
