Key Vocabulary

Hindu	A member of the Hindu faith.
Diwali	The Hindu festival of light.
Rama and Sita	Characters in a Hindu story. Prince Rama was a great warrior who was married to Sita, a clever and beautiful princess.
Ganesha	Hindu god of knowledge and good beginnings.
Mandir	Hindu temple.
Lakshmi	Hindu goddess of wealth.
Rangoli	An art form in which patterns are created on the floor near entrances and doors using flower petals, coloured sand, dry flour or coloured rice.
Diva lamps	Small pots made out of clay, filled with oil and using a cotton wick
Puja	Hindu worship. Most Hindus have a small shrine in their homes where they worship daily.

<input type="checkbox"/> Diwali is the ‘festival of lights’ and is celebrated in late autumn.	Divali takes place every year and it lasts for 5 days. The exact dates of Diwali depend on the position of the moon but it is usually celebrated during October and November.
